From the Maestro

The Delta Strummers have grown from a small informal group founded in 2004 in Discovery Bay, to over 60 members in the general East Bay Community by 2015. In the Summer of 2011, we



decided to articulate our Basic Purpose as a group of ukulele players to attract more players from the surrounding communities in the East Bay. These 6 ideals, listed below, have guided us during our rapid growth and have contributed to the high level of musicianship and fellowship that exist today in the Delta Strummers. I believe each component is equal in importance to the next and we constantly assess our progress as a group by our measure of how well we are performing to the following ideals:

Have Fun

Play to (and include) all levels in Strummers' Song Selections

Highlight Skill Players

Coach Beginners

Perform Well for Audiences

Grow Group in Size and Performance Skills

In the 4 years since 2011 we have trained 28 of the 60+ present members from beginner status; We have performed at major venues to rave reviews; We have cultivated an awareness of good music; and we've involved and encouraged a great majority of the band to perform in small groups to highlight the members' skills at singing, playing, and expression of music.

But, in my view, the most important attribute of the Delta Strummers is the legitimate joy of performance of our music to each other. The group's support for members who risk getting up in rehearsal and "auditioning" new songs and skills is amazing. The applause from within as we close off a group number with a big ending or incorporate a solo breakout is the true value of the group. The fact that our practices are as much fun (and hard work) as they are , carries over to our performances in the community.

Our "Ukulele Uprising" performance at El Campanil Theatre produced outstanding



results. People actually paid \$15 to see us, of course this included our friends and family, amounting to 377 curious folks. The total revenue was \$5,655.00, an amazing feat. El Campanil took \$2,499.00 for rent, box office, production support and ticket fees, leaving us \$3,156.00. Our expenses (for risers, programs, posters and support) were \$1,655.35, giving us a profit of \$1,500.65. Kudos to everyone!




In Memoriam

Strong Medicine

You may find yourself singing along with the Delta Strummers, thinking that your voice sounds just fine, but you seriously question the sounds from the person

sitting next to you. Well, the truth is that our impressions of musical voices can be quite deceiving.

First of all, the way we hear ourselves is quite different than how others hear us. The truth is that 'others' hear us correctly, and we hear our own selves in a distorted manner. This becomes evident the first time we listen to a recording of our voice. As we speak, (or sing), the sound not only travels to our ears through the air, but also spreads through our skull bones, making the sound appear lower than it is. In my head, I sound soooo much like Elvis, that it is astonishing. But a quick look at the disapproving glances from those sitting near me tell me I am mistaken.

Other things happen as well. As we get older we lose the ability to hear high pitched noises. This is referred to medically as presbycusis, and can begin as early as 18 years old! Many of us who are not fond of 'heavy metal' music, will at least have to admit that we are probably not sensing the same full musical experience as teen age fans of the music [sic].

And then there is amusia, a condition that affects one person in twenty. Amusia is commonly referred to as tone deafness. It is characterized by the inability to distinguish pitch, especially when two notes are close together. An amusic person cannot distinguish when they are singing 'off-key'. Hmmmm, if the condition affects about one in twenty, and there are nearly sixty people in our group, well, you do the math.

There are some interesting websites that will allow you to test yourself for presbycusis or amusia. Not only is it fun, but it can be enlightening as well. I took the tests, and may someday reveal the results. You may want to try them out as well. Here they are:

The ubiquitous ukulele

A number of our Delta Strummers band members are also active RVers (Chris and I have been RVers since the mid 80's). In discussion with other RVers, the



question comes up about the ideal instrument to take along. Personally, I've tried packing a guitar, banjo, and keyboard, but all of these take up a lot of storage space, and are too bulky to play in the RV.

Several years ago, having "discovered" the ukulele through the Delta Strummers, the answer became obvious; The ukulele takes up little storage space and can be easily played on board. It also makes it easy to practice songs from our playlist while on the road.

As we travel the country, I've been able to play with a number of ukulele clubs. Most clubs welcome visitors.

Some of our members perform &/or arrange singalongs in campgrounds.

Questions For The Board

If you have a question or issue you feel needs to be raised with the entire Board, we make time available to discuss it.

The preferred way is to document your question or issue, and submit it to our Secretary, Chuck Cannon. If you need to address the issue in person with the Board, we allocate a brief time slot in our agenda. The Board will follow up in writing to let you know the result of their discussion and any conclusions or decisions reached.

Music Selection

We're sometimes asked who makes the decision to include or exclude a song, and what's the protocol for adding them to our song book?

The process starts with our "Open mic" sessions, typically held twice a year at the end of a season. Members are encouraged to offer up new music for consideration, and to audition these selections at designated practice sessions. If a member is uncomfortable auditioning their song, they may delegate the audition to another willing member.

Most of our new music is derived from these offerings and, in fact, over 50% of the songs in our current practice list came from this source.

Music submitted for consideration needs to be in a standard 'lead sheet' format. Songs that could be too difficult for most members to sing, or too difficult for our newer members to play, may need to be transposed into a different key &/or rearranged by our Music Director.

Following audition, music is selected for inclusion in upcoming practice lists by a Music Committee. In 2015, the Music Committee is comprised of Chuck Cannon, Wally Coffman, Bob Leek, Patti Leek, Mary Ritner, and our Music Director, Ernie Macintyre.

When a practice list is created for upcoming perfor-

mances, lead sheets for all the songs are reviewed, played and sung, to identify further changes and, following editing, are added to our online Song Book.

This entire process, from submission to publication, is time consuming, which means that some prior music offerings have not yet come out the other end; Specifically, music submitted in different formats, or which is not readily playable, sits in a queue and gets dealt with as time permits.

As we get closer to a performance, Ernie will take note of which music we play well and which we're struggling with. This usually results in songs being removed from the practice list to eventually end up with a "playable" performance list.

Having participated in a number of groups who don't have this discipline, I can say that their group playing leaves a lot to be desired. Tom
